

2022 Year in Review - Victorian Community Hubs

Community hubs are designed to create social cohesion in some of the most disadvantaged communities. They are welcoming places where families from diverse backgrounds, particularly women with preschool children, can connect, share, and learn together.

Hubs are embedded in primary schools and harness existing school infrastructure, local government, and community services. Hubs bridge the gap between families and the wider community, connecting families with each other, their schools, local services and support, and providing a gateway to health, wellbeing and education services.

The 41 hubs in Victoria are located in primary schools in Brimbank (five sites), Casey (five sites), Dandenong (five sites), Geelong (three sites) Hume (15 sites) Shepparton (three sites), and Wyndham (five sites)¹. A complete list of host schools is shown in Table 1, Appendix A. In Term 1 2023, we will welcome one new replacement hub in Shepparton.

Local support for hubs is provided by City of Hume (Hume) Greater Shepparton Lighthouse Project (Shepparton), and The Smith Family (Brimbank, Casey, Dandenong, Geelong, and Wyndham).

In 2022, Victorian hubs engaged with families in a variety of ways. They delivered early childhood programs and conversational English classes, as well as vocational pathways including education and training opportunities for hub participants.

Key highlights from 2022:



4,644 families engaged with Victorian hubs



3,145 early childhood sessions were conducted across 40 hubs



3,205 conversational English classes ran across 16 hubs



152 local organisation partnered with Victorian hubs



151 jobs were secured by hub participants



506 referrals were made to early childhood services, such as maternal and child health

¹ Community hubs are funded by the federal government through the Department of Home Affairs, the Scanlon Foundation, state governments and participating schools. Hubs across nine Victorian LGAs are funded by the state government Department of Families Fairness and Housing (DFFH), DFFH will fund hubs until 2024.



Engagement

Engagement activities provide hub leaders with the opportunity to build strong relationships with families and facilitate connections to their school and local services. Hub leaders develop the hub space and the program offerings to address the needs of their host school and the local community. Activities include 'coffee and chats', sewing and craft, and gardening as well as food hamper collections.

Across 2022, hub leaders made 3,139 referrals to external support services with the most common being family support (499), emergency aid (420) and preschool (378). In addition, the Victorian community hubs partnered with 152 local organisations. For a complete list, see Table 2 Appendix A.

Early childhood

Early childhood programs such as playgroup act as a soft entry point for families to attend other hub activities, form friendships with community members or be referred to external services. Early childhood activities often take place in a hub, providing families with a comfortable and safe environment to connect.

In 2022, Victorian hubs offered early years programs that were either place-based or online. In addition, 17 hubs ran targeted school readiness programs like 'Pre-Prep' and 'Prep class garden session'.

The aim of the Prep Parents workshop is to strengthen the relationship between the school, teachers and parents to work together for the students learning and education which will set a good foundation for their future learning and outcomes. During the workshop, parents learn about the curriculum and the teaching strategies that are happening at school, as well as learning effective strategies that they will be able to use at home to support their children's learning and have better outcomes.

Parents discuss with the teacher about their concerns and the barriers that they are facing with their children's learning and wellbeing. The Hub and the teacher support the families with their concerns and the parents were given support in parenting tips, developing daily routine especially minimise the screen time and going to bed early as well as parents been encouraged to pack a healthier lunch box for their kids and learned about the importance of healthy eating habits. This workshop will strengthen the relationship between parents and teachers as well as getting teachers and parents working together for the child's learning and education. Teachers learn about families, barriers and struggles that they are faced with. Parents are learning as well about the curriculum and how they will be able to support their children education.

English

English language activities enable migrant families to build English language skills and increase confidence to participate in the community. Various types of English classes are delivered including conversational and introductory sessions to formal accredited classes.



In 2022, 39 Victorian hubs delivered English sessions place-based, offsite, or online, with at least 454 adult attendees², 58% of whom were women with a dependent child. Hubs are a welcoming and familiar space for participants to learn English, and through these sessions 22 referrals were made to the Adult Migrant English Program (AMEP). In addition, 39 partner organisations worked with hubs to deliver conversational and formal English classes.

Vocational pathways

Hubs help create career pathways and nurture core skills by delivering informal and formal training activities. Across 2022, vocational activities included participants gaining a food safety certificate, taking part in accredited courses or participating in sewing classes or work ready sessions.

For some, working or volunteering in hubs is their first employment experience and in 2022, 657 people volunteered in a Victorian hub. Hubs also referred 328 people to education and training services and delivered 840 formal and informal training sessions. They also engaged 34 partner organisations to equip participants with work ready skills, and 151 jobs were secured by hub participants during the year.
